WOMEN MOVING FORWARD

Last year, Community Living Toronto launched the Women Moving Their Career Forward Through Professional Cleaning certificate program.

With funding from United Way Greater Toronto, this is a hands-on, 8-week, paid training program that prepares women for a career in janitorial services. Included in this program are certifications in First Aid/WHMIS, Health and Safety, and Fire Prevention. This is a safe and respectful environment for women to learn valuable skills and gain confidence.

Women who wish to have a career in janitorial services are often demoted to “housekeeping” jobs and are not offered the opportunity to break into a male-dominated field. The under-representation of women with an intellectual disability in the industry is a glaring issue that needed to be fixed.

Out of the 25 women who have participated in the program so far, 15 are employed, 4 were motivated to go back to school, 4 are currently looking for employment, and 2 did not complete due to medical reasons.

Amanda, one of the first participants of the Women Moving Forward program, joined on July 2nd, 2018. She has been with Community Living Toronto in the Adult Protective Service Department

and Employment Supports Department for several years.

Growing up, Amanda’s life was anything but easy. She was put into foster care at the age of 2 and adopted when she was 3. Amanda then moved to a group home at the age of 6 due to behavioural problems where she went in and out of various group homes until being released from the Children’s Aid Society at the age of 18. Amanda then spent the next few years staying at women’s shelters across the GTA until she landed shared housing in Scarborough.

While taking the course, Amanda was very motivated to better herself and ultimately get a job where she could earn a competitive wage. Amanda’s motivation to learn helped her get 100% on all the tests and helped her demonstrate leadership, professionalism, compassion, and confidence throughout the entire program.

Amanda graduated and received the Women Moving Their Career Forward Through Professional Cleaning certificate. Three days later, she got a job at Fresh Start Cleaning Services! We are proud to say that Amanda still works at Fresh Start Cleaning and continues to maintain her employment in high standing.

Supporting goals with direct impact

Through the Choices that can Change Lives Fund, donors like you are making big opportunities come true with small grants of up to \$1,000.

We often refer to this Fund as the “Cherry on top of the Sundae” where people have been working towards a goal and will apply when all other resources have been exhausted.

To date 89 grants have been awarded.

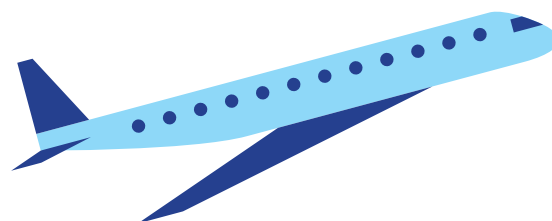

The only barrier is that Sunny cannot travel on his own without support, which isn't always available or financially possible. Last year, as Sunny and his family began setting goals and plans, they knew he would need additional help so that Sunny could continue taking part in his activities. A grant from the Choices Fund helped pay for additional Support Worker hours so Sunny could continue to attend Special Olympics basketball and Grandravine Hockey.

“ Sunny played in the Special Hockey International (SHI) Tournament in March. This yearly tournament started with 2 teams - the Grandravine Tornados (Sunny's Team) and St. Louis Special Hockey. This year the tournament celebrated 25 years with more than 60 teams from Canada, USA and the United Kingdom! Sunny looks forward to this tournament

every year. This is not a regular tournament where there is a champion, here everyone is a champion. Each team plays 4 games and at the end there's a closing ceremonies banquet.

Each player that participated receives a medal. In the photos where Sunny is wearing a medal and standing with his team, that was a highlight for me. Sunny is not one to be put into situations

where there is a lot of noise or people involved. But he wore his medal with pride and stood for pictures.”

On the advice of Omar's teachers, the family knew it was time to purchase a bike to encourage and engage him in the community. They began to research and put a plan in place, including applying to the Choices Fund.

Armed with a small grant, the purchase was made, and Omar has been on the "move" ever since.

LIGHTS PROGRAM

Webster Capital Resource Fund assists LIGHTS families

LIGHTS is a unique program that provides independent living opportunities for people with an intellectual disability. As we all know, moving can be expensive. If you are moving out on your own for the first time, beds, couches, kitchen tables, lamps, and other housing accessories can be very expensive. This can be a huge barrier in being able to move out on your own.

One of the many ways LIGHTS supports families seeking housing opportunities is through temporary funding for the start up costs of a new home. This funding bridges early cash flow needs while families seek additional resources, including government funding, to assume costs like rent and moving.

In addition to LIGHTS funding and through the generosity of the R. Howard Webster Foundation, the Webster Capital Resource Fund was created in 2015. This fund helps individuals and families engaged with LIGHTS who have a plan in place to move into a home of their own.

To help eliminate the barriers to independent living, families in need can apply for a grant of up to \$2,500 to help cover the start-up costs of essential household items.

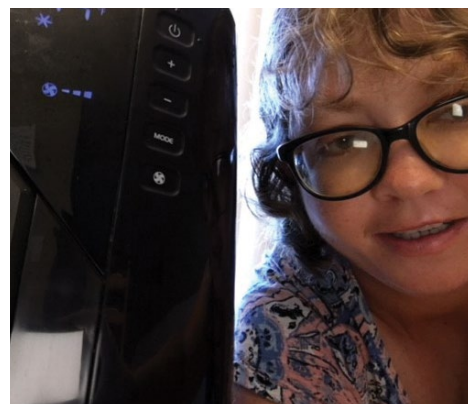
14 families have received support from the Webster Capital Resource Fund. Here are some of the recent recipients:

#ITOOKABREAK19 FOR COMMUNITY LIVING

Community Living Windsor participating in #ITookABreak19

On May 6th, members and friends gathered with MPPs at Queen's Park for Community Living Day at the Legislature, an annual event at which we celebrate the tremendous gains we have made together and consider the work that still remains.

This year, Community Living Toronto brought 400 KitKats that had been wrapped with a Community Living-branded #ITookABreak19 label. Using the KitKats as a conversation-starter with MPPs, Queen's Park staff, members, and friends, Community Living Toronto asked them to "take a break" from their work day to show their support for a society where everyone belongs. Participants were instructed to post selfies with their KitKat to social media with the hashtag #ITookABreak19.

In preparation for the Day at the Legislature and #ITookABreak19, Community Living Toronto mailed 300 KitKats (pre-wrapped with the #ITookABreak19 label) to their sponsors and donors, United Way,

City of Toronto MPs, Community Living member associations, MPPs, Toronto City Councilors, TDSB Trustees, and MCCSS staff.

The label was also made available on the Community Living Toronto website for those who didn't receive a KitKat but wanted to participate. All they had to do was download a PDF label, print it out, cut along the dotted lines, and tape it around a KitKat bar.

The results from this year's campaign were amazing, with participants sharing many unique messages of support for inclusion.

Here are a few highlights:

- The hashtag #ITookABreak19 was trending on Twitter all day and even into the evening. (Last year the hashtag only trended for a few hours.)
- There were 233 visible posts across social media platforms. This number does not include people who have their profiles set to private.
- Toronto Mayor John Tory, alongside leaders of the Ontario Liberal Party and Ontario Green Party, participated in #ITookABreak19.
- Nestle donated a total of 760 full-size KitKats and 20 bags of mini KitKats toward this campaign.

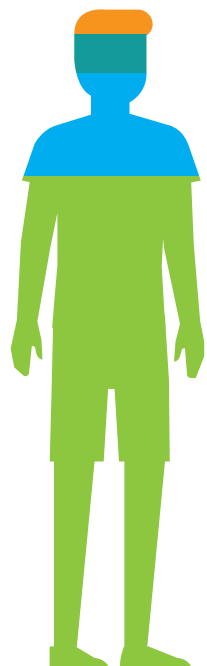
